From the Chaplain...

'Be the change you wish to see in the world,' said Mahatma Gandhi; a phrase that has been coming back to me this week as we have been reflecting on the part of our school vision in which we are encouraged 'to transform our lives and the lives of others'.

The story of Zaccheus is a story of healing and transformation, but one with a very unlikely hero. Zaccheus was hated by his community, seen as no better than a traitor and a thief. Because he collected taxes for the Roman authorities (the occupying forces and the enemy of the Jewish people). Because he charged people extra in order to line his own pockets. It is likely that Zaccheus' existence was a lonely one and perhaps his only consolation was the lifestyle and luxuries he could afford as a result of his work.

It is sad to reflect that life in the Middle East is so often still overshadowed by territorial disputes, competing authorities and occupying forces demanding compliance with strict military regimes. Many of the feelings of resentment from Zaccheus' day are still experienced today.

Shunned by polite society, never invited to weddings or parties, Zaccheus' actions set him aside as selfish and disloyal. I can picture the street falling quiet whenever Zaccheus walked by, with murmurs of discontent and offensive comments perhaps being muttered under the breath of the braver members of society; perhaps even some spitting in his direction. People's anger at Zaccheus was for good reason: businesses might have folded and families gone hungry as a result of his greed. It is a surprise that Zaccheus ventured out into the crowd the day that Jesus was passing through town and no surprise at all that he chose to hide himself away from sight in a tree. But when Jesus marched straight up to that tree and called Zaccheus down to eat with him, I can almost see the looks of disbelief and indignation on the faces of the respectable members of society who had been competing to host this honourable guest themselves.

Jesus didn't judge Zaccheus on his past actions or his reputation but saw the person Zaccheus could be and treated him with dignity and kindness. And the effect was transformational. Not just on Zaccheus himself but on the whole community, as a rift was healed, hurt was acknowledged and wrongs were put right with compassion and generosity.

'I just want people to know that I have changed and to give me a chance to show that; to give me a fresh start,' said a Year 8 boy to me recently. We can all identify with that sentiment: every single one of us has made mistakes and acted in ways we are not proud of at some stage in the past. What an amazing gift then, to hear that through Jesus, God will wipe away all that is past and look at us with dignity and love; seeing not the person we have been but only the person we can be. We might not be able to bring peace to the Middle East, though we can pray for it. But perhaps we can do one small thing and give one person we know a fresh start?

O God of all
Of Abraham, Sarah, Hagar, Isaac, and Ishmael:
Our hearts are broken in pieces at the suffering and murder of your people.
Our voices cry for peace and for justice.
Comfort those who grieve,
Console and heal the injured,
Be close to those in fear,
Restrain with your mighty hand those who perpetrate violence.

Send us your wisdom in all that we say and do,
That our voice may always seek justice, peace and security for all.
Amen.
