The theme for worship w.c. 6th Nov is 'Journey in Faith without limits'

From the Chaplain...

'One of my favourite of all passages from the Bible is in the first chapter of Paul's letter to the Colossians in which he talks about position of Christ in the cosmos, making it clear that not only are all things in the universe connected, but that all things are connected in and for God: For in him all things were created: things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or powers or rulers or authorities; all things have been created through him and for him. He is before all things, and in him all things hold together.

Our Bible text this week is from John's gospel, chapter 10 and contains words spoken by Jesus which are central to the vision of the Three Spires Trust: I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full. Jesus repeatedly talks about himself as the good shepherd, protecting and leading his people into places of abundance; he calls himself the way and in this passage he calls himself the gate... the way to fullness of life, the way to joy and the way to freedom. Is it possible that someone might attain this fullness of life in isolation? I believe not. We remember being cut off from one another during lockdown and though we may have benefitted in some small ways there was much that stopped us from enjoying the fullness of life together. Right at the heart of the story of God and humankind is a story of relationship. The relationship of God with His people and the relationship of humankind with one another. The more we consider it, the more it seems that the universe was indeed planned, created and set up to evolve in such a way that each one needs, relies upon and benefits each other.

We have seen this ourselves in our interactions with the environment. When we have used pesticides and poisons on our fields to boost production we have discovered that the harm caused to certain species has had much wider implications than we could have imagined. In recent years we have witnessed a worrying decline in the numbers of bees and other pollinators, a great concern to us as we consider the implications on our ability to feed ourselves if that trend were



to continue.
This week at school we celebrate harvest. As we rejoice and give thanks for God's gifts to us in generous abundance we are aware that so many in our world, in our city and even within our school community are not enjoying the same abundance. Can we truly flourish as a school and as a community while such inequalities and injustices are allowed to continue? Ae we gather gifts this week to support those in need in our community and hear from local foodbanks about the amazing work that they do, we pray for the time when we might truly live alongside one another in a spirit of peaceful generosity and compassion, that we might flourish together as the people God intended us to be.
