
## WINTER COAT PROJEC

## From the Chaplain...

Two thousand years ago a young couple living ordinary lives in a small middle eastern country, looking forward with hope to married life together, were suddenly entrusted with a huge responsibility and thrust into a situation which would challenge their faith, putting them at odds with both their family and their community.

Mary would likely have been a teenager when her life took this unexpected turn. "Don't be afraid, Mary" announced the angel Gabriel, "The Lord has greatly blessed you!" And we have been considering this week the roller-coaster of emotions that Mary must have felt on hearing the news of her pregnancy and God's plans through her. I can't imagine that every day in the next nine months would have felt like a blessing. And yet, we are familiar with Mary's response and can only wonder at the great courage and trust she showed as she accepted the role given to her; "I am the Lord's servant, may it happen to me as you have said."

When we think of the challenges the young couple faced as they trusted in God and in one another: social exclusion, questioning and disappointment from their loved ones, a long journey whilst heavily pregnant, giving birth in a cattle shed, becoming refugees and having to flee the country with a new born child... it certainly puts the challenges we face in our lives into perspective, doesn't it!

I wonder if Mary and Joseph too had moments of asking, as we sometimes do, "Why would God allow this to happen to us? Where is he in all of this chaos in our lives?" In fact it can be very hard to step back from our day to day worries and see the bigger picture in our lives, and it is quite natural for us to ask "What is God doing right now in my story?"

With the hindsight we can see that God was very much at work not only in the lives of Mary and Joseph, but through them in the lives of the people of Israel, Palestine and humanity as a whole. God's plan was to bring unity, peace, hope, reconciliation and fullness of life to all who chose to accept it, and the young Mary and Joseph played a pivotal role in his plan.

That's all very well, but where are the peace, unity and reconciliation now? It is clear that God's plan has not yet come to full fruition. As we reflect on the story of Mary and Joseph and the roles they played, let us listen out for God's call to us too. A plan not just for a small nation of people who lived hundreds of years ago whose history is recorded in the pages of the Bible. Our God is alive now in the lives of people across the world: can you hear him calling you? Perhaps (and hopefully) not to give up your home and family and to bring up a child whose life will regularly be at risk; but nonetheless a plan for the blessing and well-being of humankind. Are you ready to listen, to trust him and to accept the role he has for you? I pray that we are!
