

## **Mobile Phones**

Please may we take this opportunity to remind Parents, Carers and Pupils of the school policy regarding sanctions for mobile phones.

The information opposite is taken from page 18 of the Handbook and Calendar that all students have been issued.

Mobile phones are not allowed in school and if seen by a member of staff will be confiscated and recorded in class charts. Pupils will be able to collect their phone from Reception at the end of the day.

Third confiscation	Class Charts log, phone returned to the pupil at the end of the day, letter home and an SLT detention issued.  Intel event to alert HOY who contacts parents.
Fourth confiscation	Class Charts log, phone returned to the pupil at the end of the day.  Intel event to alert HOY who contacts parents and informs parents that the phone will need to be handed in at Reception at the start of each day for a week.

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## From the Chaplain....


'Christian hope means certain expectation of something not yet seen' said Archbishop Justin Welby during the funeral of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. It is certainly true that for many of us who live in faith that our hope and joy come from our belief and trust in a God who loves us and who has a plan for us which is better that we can imagine; a God who sustains us and is with us no matter what hardship we endure; a God who understands and knows what we are going through when we are suffering. It is also true that we really need a bit of hope in the world at the moment, don't we? There is much cause for despair and anxiety with all the changes in our national and global politics, with the huge rises in the cost of living and with shortening of our days and the spreading of coughs and colds as autumn progresses. So where does our hope come from?

In our Bible story this week, we heard about a woman who had been ill for twelve years, had spent all her money on doctors and was now feeling desperate. This woman would have been suffering physically from extreme tiredness and weakness and she would also have been ostracised from society, the Jewish laws at the time having proclaimed her 'unclean'. Hearing of the miracles that Jesus was performing, she risked punishment and public humiliation and crept through the crowd to him, believing that just by touching the edge of his clothing she would be cured. What amazing faith after twelve years of steadily getting worse and nobody being able to help her! Trembling with the fear of being found out and punished, this remarkable woman was met instead with incredible compassion, physical healing and the possibility of reintegration into society. Her faith was commended and she was able to live as part of the community once more. A real story of hope at a time of despair. And the Bible is full of stories of God doing amazing things in the lives of people who are not expecting them or people who have been written off as 'hopeless' by the rest of society.

But there is another aspect to this story, which is also a source of hope. This is a story about God noticing the 'little people', the people who are ignored or seen as unimportant by others. Not only is the main character a woman, but she is by now poor and ill: unable to contribute to society and therefore of no worth or status in the social hierarchy of the time. And though Jesus was in a hurry on his way to heal the daughter of an important religious official who was critically ill, and although the rest of the crowd didn't even notice her, still Jesus made the time to stop, to care and to pay attention to this woman.

I wonder how we might share some hope with the people we meet over the next few days?
