Dear Parents and Carers

We have had a very positive start to the new term. I am impressed with the respect, responsibility and empathy shown by all our pupils returning to school. We are now back in to the routines of carrying out the Lateral Flow tests twice a week and wearing face masks in every classroom and teaching space as well as the communal areas. Thank you for your support with this too.

At the moment, our numbers of positive Covid cases amongst the school community are low and we continue to work hard to ensure we are keeping alert and safe. I am conscious that there have been some more changes recently and want to share these with you:

Lateral Flow Testing:

All pupils, with consent are expected to continue with the LFD testing twice a week. We do have plenty of stock at school and if you need more tests then these can be collected from the Head of Year base.

The guidance has now been updated and a PCR test is only needed if the LFD test is positive and your child or yourself are showing symptoms. If the LFD test is positive and you do not have any symptoms then you do not need a PCR test.

Self Isolation:

From Monday 17 January, people who are self-isolating with COVID-19 will have the option to reduce their isolation period after 5 full days if they test negative with a lateral flow device (LFD) test on both day 5 and day 6 and they do not have a temperature. For example, if they test negative on the morning of day 5 and the morning of day 6, they can return to their education or childcare setting immediately on day 6.

If the result of either of their tests is positive, they should continue to self-isolate until they get negative results from two LFD tests on consecutive days or until they have completed 10 full days of self-isolation, whichever is earliest.

Anyone who is unable to take LFD tests or anyone who continues to have a temperature will need to complete the full 10 day period of self-isolation.

Your child does not have to self isolate if another person in the household has tested positive. As a precaution we strongly

recommend that your child tests regularly and limit the contact they have

with that person.

So far, we have only reported a low number of positive Covid cases amongst the school community. We continue to work hard to ensure that we can keep safe and well and minimise the distraction to any learning.



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From the Chaplain....

Have you ever felt that the challenges we face are simply too big for you to make a difference? Some of the challenges facing humankind certainly feel that way. Is it even possible for us to avoid ecological disaster and the worst effects of climate change? Could we ever achieve world peace? Or equality for all?

The challenge facing the Israelites, around a thousand years before Jesus' birth, was a giant named Goliath who taunted them, challenged them to a fight and threatened to take them all as slaves to the Philistines. The Israelites were afraid and none of them could see a way out of this desperate situation. It took a young man with no experience of military training but a great passion for justice and lots of faith in God and his desire to bless his people, to stand up and make a difference. David didn't expect to become a military hero in his own power, but he did believe that if he was willing to play his part, to do what he could, then God would do the rest.

David's victory against Goliath was not the end of the war against the Philistines... there would be more battles. But it was certainly a turning point and a wonderful victory for God.
