

Stay safe over the Holiday..... Remember......

- Stay safe on the roads
- Take care around water
- Be responsible with your phone use. Make sure you are taking "screen breaks".

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Strike Action 1st March 2023

The Governing Body and Mr Coombes have decided the school will be open only to certain groups of students and arrangements for 1st March 2023 will be as follows:

Year 7, 11 and Year 13 students will be able to attend school but learning activities may differ from their usual timetables.

Other year groups students identified by the school in Year 8, 9 and 10 will be asked to attend school on that day (parents/carers will receive a separate notification for this should it apply to their child).

After school activities including sports events will not take place on that day.

Students normally receiving free school meals but not in attendance that day will be able to collect a preordered cold packed lunch if they wish to.

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
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PE News.....

Jonah was angry. The people of Nineveh had listened to him, and turned from their evil ways: you would think he might be over the moon, but instead he was angry. Deep down he felt that these people deserved to be punished but instead they were benefitting from God's mercy. It just wasn't fair.

I am sure we have all felt at times that life isn't fair. We have all known the anger of injustice when we have been wronged and our voice hasn't been heard. Perhaps we have also raged like Jonah when others have gone unpunished for the hurt they have caused. Anyone who has worked with children or young people will recognise that human beings seem to have been born with a strong and innate sense of justice. As a Year 7 form tutor I can claim that half the time a pupil raises their hand it is to tell me that someone else isn't following the rules!

About fifteen years ago I was feeling angry. I had been wronged and now the systems that were there to ensure fairness had been badly applied and I was not getting the justice I deserved. Life wasn't fair and I was feeling particularly bitter and resentful about it... when I had a revelation. (In retrospect it seems obvious, but it seemed like a revelation at the time!) We all long for the world to be a bit more just, but given the choice would we rather live in a fair world or a generous world? Whatever our answer to that question, we can choose to do something about it. When we come back from our half term break we will be entering into the season of lent and our lent appeal this year is all about generosity and justice as we seek to do our bit to transform the world around us in raising money for Water Aid.
