Harriet Tubman

This half term, students have been studying the life of Harriet Tubman who was a key figure in helping many slaves escape slavery using the "Underground Railway" in America. We are keen to work closely with Parents/Carers to support and secure the best outcomes for every child in Year 11 and your online attendance at the Parents' Evening is critical in ensuring we work together to ensure your child makes as much progress as possible throughout Year 11. As we are currently unable to meet face-to-face in school we are using our **online appointment booking system** called School Cloud.

This is a very important date in the school calendar as it is a critical time in Year 11 and is the opportunity to meet subject teachers to discuss your son/daughter's progress and attainment ahead of the Pre-Public Examinations in November. As part of the progress conversations teachers will discuss how best pupils can prepare for these exams.

The online appointment booking system, School Cloud, allows you to choose your own 5 minute appointment times with subject teachers and you will receive an email confirming your appointments. Please be aware that we have to limit the number of appointments each subject teacher can make within the two hour time slot so please book as soon as possible. Appointments can be made from **Monday 11th October 9am and will close at 3.30pm on Wednesday 20th October**.

Please visit the 'Parent' section of our school website and click on School Cloud in the menu. <u>https://www.kingswolverhampton.co.uk/schoolcloud</u> to book your appointments. A short guide on how to add appointments is included.

Login with the following information when you access the webpage: Your details (email required) and student details.

If we do not have your parent email on file you will not be able to access the booking system so please contact the school office as soon as possible and provide it so we can update our records. If you do not have access to the internet, please contact Mrs Buckle and she will be happy to add appointments on your behalf.

As we are holding online appointments, lasting exactly 5 minutes (there will be a countdown so you are aware when the meeting will automatically close), we would kindly ask that you:

- Consider your background when selecting where to access the online meeting
- Ensure everyone in the meeting be dressed in daytime clothing

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
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From the Chaplain....

Have you ever been lost for words? Perhaps it was for a good reason; a beautiful view or an overwhelmingly kind gesture. Or perhaps you were so frustrated or shocked that you couldn't find words which did justice to the strength of your feelings. Our reading this week is from St Paul's letter to the early church in Rome, at a time when they were experiencing injustice and suffering. He says that when we can't find the words to express ourselves in prayer, then God's Spirit himself prays within us on our behalf 'in groans that words cannot express'.

Following World Mental Health Day on Sunday we have been recognising this week some of the countless ways in which we are blessed. Most of us wake up each morning in a comfy bed, in a warm, dry home. We have light at the flick of a switch, hot water on tap and a shop nearby with shelves full of food. These basic 'needs' which we take for granted would have amazed and astounded our ancestors a few hundred years ago, and would still be marvelled at by some communities in the world today. A colleague on Thursday morning shared with us how she has developed an attitude of gratitude over recent years and encouraged us too, to recognise the many small ways in which we are blessed.

We know that there is still a lot of suffering in our world. It is easy to watch the news and to get caught up in the hopelessness of desperate situations. What can we do to change what seem like huge and insurmountable problems, small and powerless as we are?

As we open our eyes to the blessings in our own lives and pray with grateful hearts for all that we have received, we start to feel that we want to offer something back to God. And as we turn our thoughts in compassion to those who are less fortunate, those who are suffering, God's Spirit works within us to open up possibilities for making a difference. Again and again, throughout the Bible, God works together with people to do the impossible in desperate situations when hope is all but lost. God enlisted the help of Moses to free his people from oppression and to open up a way through the Red Sea. Jesus' enlisted the help of his disciples to provide a feast for more than 5000 hungry people when he had nothing more to offer than a small boy's packed lunch. He is doing the same today; can we be open to noticing and responding to the opportunities he puts in our paths?
