Year 12 are currently on work experience, getting a hands-on experience of the working world.

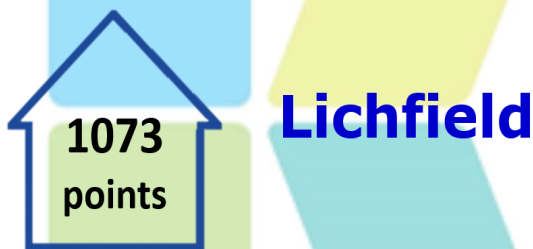

These are taking place at the Mander Centre Health Hub, Wednesdays 26 July, 2,9, 16, 23 and 30 August, between 1.30-3.30pm.

Emily Bloomfield, School Nurse Leader, said "The School Nursing Service is excited to be offering a new weekly drop-in service in Wolverhampton City Centre. School Nurses are registered nurses that have additional qualifications and specialist training to support young people with their health and wellbeing."

Sports Day

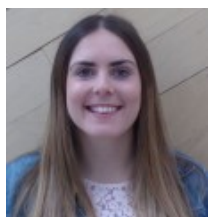

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From the Chaplain....

I have been prompted to think again about Ananias, who in our Bible story this week (Acts 9:10-18) was sent to heal Saul from his blindness and to welcome him among the community of believers.

I feel I have previously underestimated the incredible amount of love and trust he showed in treating Saul, who had been torturing and murdering Ananias' fellow believers, with such dignity and care. He also showed huge courage in agreeing to go to Saul in the first place, given Saul's efforts to exterminate all followers of Jesus. As I consider where this ability to trust came from, I have been reflecting on our own responses when we are called to act in ways that might initially cause us fear or anxiety.



In this age of 'Health and Safety' and 'Risk Assessments' most of us may never have been asked to put ourselves in a situation where we are in serious physical danger, although accidents do happen and we live with a certain amount of risk every time we leave the house. Occasionally we have had to face particular fears, such as a fear of heights; and although the logical part of our brain knows that the risk is in fact extremely low, the panic we feel is nonetheless very real. Most of us have had several experiences in life where we have been encouraged to leave our comfort zones in some way. The risk we face might not be physical, but the anxiety caused by going into a new social situation, dealing with unfamiliar authorities or embarking on a project which might fail or end in public embarrassment can be just as debilitating. When I ask colleagues if they are willing to share a 'thought for the day' with the staff team during our weekly briefings, I know that many get anxious talking about their experience or sharing their personal ideas in such a public forum. I also know how much each one of those thoughts is valued and appreciated by their colleagues. I remember how long it took me and how many barriers I put up when it was first suggested I might train to preach, before I was eventually ready (and even willing) to talk to someone about the training.

So where does that courage and trust come from? Perhaps in essence it is the faith and belief that our God loves us and wants the best for us and that there is nothing on earth that will ever cause him to leave us or abandon us. Alongside that, is an acceptance that God has a plan, a plan more amazing than any we ourselves could ever imagine, and that his plan is for our happiness and well-being. Finally, is the realisation that he is inviting us, limited as we are, to play a role in the fulfilment of his plan and that by having faith and by taking the risk of following the course he has set before us, he will be able to grow in us and do amazing things through us in the world.
