

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From the Chaplain....

In our Bible reading this week Jesus rode into Jerusalem and was warmly welcomed and cheered by the crowds, the long awaited Messiah of the Jews. The people were expecting a great leader who would deliver them from the oppressive Roman regime they were living under, but Jesus arrived on a young donkey: not very majestic! The Pharisees expected the Messiah to be a very religious man; but Jesus, who ate with sinners and touched the unclean, didn't seem very pious. In fact, he seemed more interested in understanding and getting alongside people than putting them in their place as other religious leaders did.

What do we expect of our leaders today? What sorts of qualities do we look for in a good leader? Recent news reports about our own political leaders would suggest that we value honesty and integrity, but also someone who will act decisively and with authority in a crisis. Political and religious leaders, rich and powerful men and women around the world today are often obvious by their big houses, expensive cars and numerous body guards. Sometimes, as in the case of Herod and Pilate, they punish harshly or choose to please the crowds over acting with integrity, in order to keep a tenuous hold on the authority they wield. Their sometimes brutal actions can often stem from a fear of losing control or being replaced in their position of power.

How different was Jesus' authority. God in Jesus had given up all his majestic status to walk humbly among the poorest and least powerful. He didn't need wealth and human recognition to validate him because he was sure of who he was... even the wind and the waves obeyed him. Nobody could take away his identity, even in his final hours of suffering and death on the cross, and so he was able to act generously, from a heart full of love and compassion.

How true it is that God does not see as we see and that our ways are not his ways. Which human leader in a crisis would surrender in that way? No wonder people misunderstood him and soon turned against him. And yet, as we will hear next week, in their greatest confusion and their deepest moments of despair, God was actually doing something wonderful beyond our imaginations. 'For the foolishness of God is wiser than human wisdom, and the weakness of God is stronger than human strength' (1 Corinthians 1:25)

Let's remember this week that true power and strength are often hidden in gentleness and kindness and that hope is to be found in the least expected places.

People shouted their praises as Jesus rode into Jerusalem on a young donkey. What fills our hearts with joy and hope?
